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Introduction


The California Boating and Waterways Commission is required to prepare and submit a triennial program report to the governor; the Assembly Committee on Water, Parks, and Wildlife; the Senate Committee on Natural Resources and Water; the Senate Committee on Appropriations; and the Assembly Committee on Appropriations.

The California Boating and Waterways Commission Triennial Program Report combines and details specific California Department of Parks and Recreation, Division of Boating and Waterways (DBW) programs as required by Harbors and Navigation Code (HNC) Section 82.3(g)(1). This report identifies any regulations adopted or being considered by the DBW and any loan or grant that has been evaluated for funding consideration. The reporting period of this document is January 1, 2020 through December 31, 2022. Some programs are on a state fiscal cycle and others are on a federal cycle.

Below is a breakdown of DBW programs by type of cycle:

- State Cycle: Public Boating Facility Grants, Private and Public Marina Loans, Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange Grants, Shoreline Erosion Control/Public Beach Restoration Grants, and Quagga and Zebra Mussel Infestation Prevention Grants.
- Federal Cycle: Federal Clean Vessel Act Grants, Federal Recreational Boating Safety Grants, and the Federal Boating Infrastructure Grants.

The California Boating and Waterways Commission would like to thank the DBW for its assistance in developing this report.



About the California Boating and Waterways Commission

The California Boating and Waterways Commission is authorized by statute to advise the DBW and comment on all matters within its jurisdiction, as well as all on boating facility loans and grants proposed by the division.

Seven commissioners form the California Boating and Waterways Commission, appointed by the governor and confirmed by the Senate Rules Committee. Each commissioner serves a four-year term. The HNC specifies that in making appointments to the California Boating and Waterways Commission, the governor shall give primary consideration to the geographical location of the residences of members as related to boating activities and harbors.

Additional appointment requirements include that one commissioner shall represent each of the following categories of the boating community:

- Private small craft harbor owner and operator.
- Member of a recognized statewide organization representing recreational boaters.
- Peace officer or employee of a local law enforcement agency responsible for enforcing boating laws.

About the Division of Boating and Waterways

DBW was established as the Department of Boating and Waterways in 1957 following enactment of legislation supported by the recreational boating community. That legislation established a state boating agency dedicated to all aspects of recreational boating and a special account, the Harbors and Watercraft Revolving Fund (HWRF), to support department activities.

Since 2013, DBW has continued to serve recreational boaters as a division of the California Department of Parks and Recreation.

Legislation 2020-2022

Assembly Bill 1682 (Boerner Horvath, Ch. 203, Statutes of 2022)

This bill clarified that public safety and lifeguard rescue vessels, including personal watercrafts, are authorized to utilize blue lights and are exempt from the 5-mph speed limit identified for specific areas in HNC Section 655.2, which includes within 100 feet of a person bathing or waterskiing, within 200 feet of a beach, swimming float, diving platform, etc.

Assembly Bill 591 (Villapudua, Ch. 57, Statutes of 2021)

This bill authorized peace officers to issue a “fix-it ticket” for the following vessel-related violations: (1) expired vessel registration; (2) failure to paint the vessel identification number on the forward half of the boat; (3) operating a vessel without possessing an operating license; (4) failure to display registration stickers on a vessel; (5) using a recreational boat without a proper floatation device; (6) operating a boat without a properly serviced fire extinguisher; and (7) having a fire extinguisher without the proper metallic name plate.

Assembly Bill 817 (Wood, Ch. 607, Statutes of 2021)

This bill authorized the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) to issue sport fishing licenses, valid for 12 consecutive months, until January 1, 2030, as specified. This bill also authorized CDFW to provide an electronic mobile device option to display fishing licenses, by January 1, 2023. The bill required CDFW to report to the Legislature, on or before January 1, 2025, on recommendations to increase fishing license fees to fully offset program administrative costs. Additionally, the bill required CDFW to report to the Legislature on or before January 1, 2028, evaluating all sport fishing licenses, as specified.

Status of Regulations

California Boater Card Program



On September 18, 2014, Governor Jerry Brown signed Senate Bill 941 (Monning, Chapter 433, Statutes of 2014) into law, creating the mandatory boating education program and certification requirement known as the California Boater Card (CBC) Program. This program requires operators of motorized vessels to take an approved boating safety course, pass an approved exam, and obtain and carry a vessel operator card. The program is being phased in by age and began January 1, 2018. As of January 1, 2023, boaters 50 years of age or younger are required to have a boater card, and by January 1, 2025, all boaters will be required to carry the card regardless of age.

The first rulemaking package for the CBC, which establishes the fee for the card, was approved December 16, 2019, and is now part of the California Code of Regulations (CCR). DBW is now in the process of completing a second rulemaking package that will define the application process, course and exam standards, and exemptions.

Status of Loans and Grants

Boating Safety and Boating Law Enforcement Financial Aid Grants

Boating Safety and Enforcement Financial Aid grants provide state financial aid to local agencies with qualified boating safety and enforcement programs, pursuant to Section 663.7 of the HNC. The purpose is to augment a participating agency's revenues for boating safety and enforcement activities.

This voluntary program is not intended to fully fund the participating agency's boating safety and enforcement activities, but to enhance those programs.

Boating Safety and Enforcement Equipment Grants

To meet DBW's objective to provide public access to safe and enjoyable boating on California's waterways, and in accordance with the HNC Section 61.4, the Boating Safety and Enforcement Equipment grant program provides funding for equipment to local law enforcement agencies. Grant awards are determined based on need, usage, and in accordance with the priorities established in 14 CCR Section 6594.5 subsections (b), (2), and (3). Due to limited funding, this is a competitive grant program. Overall in the fiscal years 2020/2021, 2021/2022, and 2022/2023, DBW received \$9,382,960 in requests and awarded \$4,654,913 from the federal Recreational Boating Safety grant.

Boating Safety and Boating Law Enforcement Training Grants

DBW's Marine Law Enforcement Training Program funds statewide training courses for local law enforcement officers, harbor patrol officers, lifeguards, and other first responders who patrol in marine environments. Statewide training provides consistent enforcement of boating laws on all California waterways. With more than 100 local government agencies providing boating law enforcement in California, the purpose of the training program is to provide comprehensive, current, and effective training courses. From 2020-2022, DBW provided over 80 classes and trained more than 1,000 participants.

Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange Grants

In 2014, two programs vital to the state's efforts in reducing and eliminating abandoned recreational vessels, the Abandoned Watercraft Abatement Fund (AWAF) for removal of abandoned recreational vessels and the proactive Vessel Turn-In Program, were combined into one grant program titled the Surrendered and Abandoned Vessel Exchange (SAVE) Program. The combination of removing abandoned vessels and receiving surrendered vessels into one grant program provides flexibility for the awardees by allowing them to utilize grant funds for either purpose as needs arise. The SAVE program provides local assistance grants to public agencies for the abatement, removal, storage, and disposal of abandoned or surrendered recreational vessels and for the removal of other navigational hazards on California's waterways. These efforts improve public and navigational safety and reduce environmental damage to our waterways.



SAVE is legislatively mandated by HNC Section 525 and is funded through DBW's HWRF account and fines imposed and collected under Penal Code Section 1463.001. Pursuant to HNC Section 525(d)(1)(A), 80% of fines collected are deposited into AWAF and the remaining 20% goes to the agency that issued the citation. Agencies receiving these grants are required to provide a 10% matching contribution.

Overall in the fiscal years 2020/2021, 2021/2022, and 2022/2023, DBW received \$9,405,579 in application requests and awarded \$8,250,000 from the AWAF. Due to limited funding, this is a competitive program.

Infrastructure Grants and Loans

HNC Sections 65-77.1 authorizes DBW to provide leadership and funding to develop or rehabilitate boating facilities, to participate in federal programs for boating facility improvement, and to enable public beach restoration and erosion control.

Public Small Craft Harbor and Private Recreational Marina Loans

These loan programs provide funding to plan, design, renovate, and construct small craft harbors, marinas, and dry storage facilities.

DBW has initiated, funded, and provided guidelines for the development of public and private marinas. In fact, most of the facilities along California's coastline were either initially funded or improved by this loan program.

The division has a loan portfolio of approximately \$90 million from 46 loans to 19 public and private entities. These loans generate approximately \$3.8 million in annual interest revenue to the HWRF and \$4.8 million in principal repayments.

Public Marinas – 2020/2021–2022/2023*

No applications were submitted. One loan agreement for \$5.5 million was executed with the City of Berkeley to replace Docks D and E at the Berkeley Marina.

Private Marinas – 2020/2021–2022/2023*

No applications were received.

*These loan programs are currently suspended.

Boat Launching Facility Grants

Since 1958, DBW has funded, designed, and provided guidelines in the development and rehabilitation of recreational boat launching facilities (BLFs) to provide boater access to California's ocean, rivers, and lakes. Most boat launching facilities in California were either initially funded or improved by the division's boat launching facility development programs.

DBW received 15 applications requesting \$23,291,897 during fiscal years 2020/2021, 2021/2022, and 2022/2023; nine grant agreements were executed for a total of \$13,011,650; and one application requesting \$903,000 is still pending. These projects are funded from HWRF.

Non-Motorized Boat Launching Facility Grants

The Non-Motorized Boat Launching Facility grant program creates or improves public access to serve the rapidly growing paddling community (kayaks, rafts, stand-up paddleboards, canoes, etc.).

Ramp Repair and Modification Grants

Ramp repair and modification grants provide funding to quickly restore safe and convenient public boating access at launching facilities that have been damaged by wind, waves, floods, accidents, or wildfires or made inaccessible due to drought conditions and/or other natural disasters.

No applications were received, and no grants were awarded in fiscal years 2020/2021, 2021/2022, and 2022/2023.




Federal Clean Vessel Act Grants

Since the Federal Clean Vessel Act (CVA) was enacted in 1992, DBW has been the state entity responsible for administering this federal CVA program that provides grant funding for sewage management equipment and clean boating education. Examples of projects include vessel sewage waste disposal through pumpout and dump station construction, replacement, and operations; deployment of floating restrooms on lakes and reservoirs; as well as providing boater education focused on keeping sewage out of our waterways.

During 2019/2020, 2020/2021, and 2021/2022, DBW has awarded the following:

- **Pumpout Facilities:** Six applications totaling \$409,450 were received; four grants totaling \$303,011 have been awarded from the federal trust fund.
- **Operation and Maintenance:** Two applications totaling \$14,603 were received; two grants totaling \$10,849 have been awarded from the federal trust fund.
- **Floating Restrooms:** 19 applications were received, requesting 30 restrooms; 14 were awarded for a total cost of \$2,787,930. Floating restrooms are funded 75% from the federal trust fund and 25% from the HWRF.
- **Education and Outreach:** Six applications totaling \$1,491,731 were received and have been awarded from the federal trust fund.

DBW is also the state entity responsible for administering federal grants for the nationally competitive Boating Infrastructure Grant (BIG) Program which provides funding for infrastructure improvements to meet the needs of transient recreational vessels 26 feet or more in length.

Shoreline Erosion Control and Public Beach Restoration Grants

Authorized by HNC Sections 65-67.4 and 69.5-69.9, DBW is responsible for studying problems of coastal erosion statewide and for constructing and/or funding projects to stabilize beaches and shoreline areas. Stabilization can be accomplished through construction of hard structures like seawalls, groins, or rock revetments (fundable under the Shoreline Erosion Control Program) or through strategically engineered placement of sand on the beach or in the nearshore environment (fundable under both the Shoreline Erosion Control Program and the Public Beach Restoration Program). State policy generally directs DBW to focus its shoreline protection expenditures on locations where public safety is most at risk and where public benefits will be maximized.

The division partners with other government agencies to study, plan, and construct shoreline erosion control projects and to actively pursue and promote federal and local partnerships to share the costs of beach restoration projects. These partnership activities include, but are not limited to, providing local assistance grants to public agencies through an annual application process. Some projects under these programs are also cost-shared with the federal government, which can pay one-half to two-thirds of project costs. DBW also funds ongoing project management for the Coastal Sediment Management Workgroup, a federal/state partnership that works with local and regional governments to document coastal erosion issues and potential solutions.

The Public Beach Restoration Fund (PBRF) was established in 1999 by Assembly Bill 64, as a source of financial support for beach restoration projects under the Public Beach Restoration Act. However, the PBRF has no statutorily defined revenue source. During this reporting period the following applications were received.

- **Public Beach Restoration:** Twenty-three complete applications totaling \$66,141,598 were submitted and/or reviewed during this reporting period; two grant agreements have been executed; and one more is pending for a total award of \$15,485,000. These projects are funded through the PBRF via a General Fund transfer. At the end of the reporting period, three of these 23 applications were under consideration for funding through the annual state budget process.

- Shoreline Erosion Control:** Fourteen complete applications totaling \$22,858,855 were submitted and/or reviewed during this reporting period; no grant agreements were executed. At the end of the reporting period, none of these 14 applications were under consideration for funding through the annual state budget process. No applications for funding in fiscal year 2023/2024 were received.

Quagga and Zebra Mussel Infestation Prevention Grants

The Quagga and Zebra Mussel Infestation Prevention Grant Program (QZ Grant Program) was established by Assembly Bill 2443 (Williams, Ch. 485, Statutes of 2012), with the first grants awarded by DBW to grantees in fiscal year 2014/2015. The program provides funding to assess the vulnerability of and develop implementation programs to prevent the introduction of quagga and zebra mussels in California's reservoirs. Funding for this program originates from the Quagga and Zebra Mussel Infestation Prevention Fee collected by the California Department of Motor Vehicles (DMV) and transferred into a subaccount of the HWRF.

In 2007 and 2008, nonnative quagga and zebra mussels were discovered in California, respectively. These mussels pose an immediate and significant threat to California's water supply, flood control, power generation, aquatic recreation infrastructure, and the ecological integrity of the state's waterways.

Eligibility criteria for the QZ Grant Program requires that 1) applicants own or have management authority over any aspect of the water in a reservoir, 2) the reservoir must be free from quagga and zebra mussels, and 3) the reservoir must be open to the public for recreational activities. This program involves a high degree of interagency collaboration and coordination by DBW with federal, state, and local agencies, in grantor/grantee relationships. The division also participates in a multiagency task force led by the California Department of Fish and Wildlife (CDFW) for quagga and zebra mussel infestation prevention.


In accordance with HNC Section 676, DBW provides funding for QZ grants, as well as funding to CDFW for their quagga and zebra mussel efforts involving infestation prevention, inspection programs, and the review and scoring of QZ grant applications. Other quagga and zebra mussel prevention efforts are carried out by the California Department of Food and Agriculture for border



inspection efforts of quagga zebra and mussels, pursuant to funding identified in HNC Section 85.2(e).

The guiding statutes and regulations for the QZ grant program are found in HNC Sections 675-677, Fish and Game Code Section 2302, and Vehicle Code Sections 9853, 9860, and 9863. Regulations for this program are found in CCR Title 14, Section 5200 et al., and Section 5300 et al. In September 2020, the California Office of Administrative Law approved a revision to Section 5200 et al., of the regulations, which became effective January 1, 2021. The revision focused on separating the purchase of the Mussel Fee Sticker from the vessel registration process.

The Mussel Fee Sticker is required of all registered vessels boating in fresh water. It is \$16, valid for two years, and sold by DMV online at dmv.ca.gov/musselfee, at DMV field offices, as well as through auto clubs, such as AAA. Proceeds from this sticker are deposited into a subaccount of the HWRF, which provides the funding for the QZ grants, DBW's QZ Unit, and CDFW's QZ work.

Aquatic Center Grants

Each year through the Aquatic Center Grants Program, DBW provides on-the-water training to more than 60,000 beginning and intermediate boaters at 49 locations throughout the state. Funded through the federal Recreational Boating Safety grant from the Sport Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund, the program works with colleges and universities, cities, and counties, and nonprofit organizations dedicated to boating safety education. Since January 1, 2020, \$4.02 million has been awarded to 49 organizations that provided on-the-water boating safety education to more than 131,000 people.



Introducing boating to underserved communities is an important aspect of the Aquatic Center Grants Program. Many of the aquatic centers receiving these grants serve youth, special needs populations, and other

disadvantaged groups. These scholarship grants provide basic, enjoyable, on-the-water classes that teach safe boating skills in kayaking, sailing, personal watercraft, wakeboarding, and waterskiing to youth and adults who are not able to afford them. During fiscal years 2020/2021 and 2021/2022, 32% of the people receiving aquatic center boating safety education came from underserved populations.

DBW also provides grant funding for instructor training, equipment, supplies, and participation at National Safe Boating Week events that occur every May. In 2020, due to COVID-19 restrictions and closures, all events were canceled. In 2021, only three events were held and attended by 155 people. In 2022, 19 events were held with over 8,600 people in attendance.

The following tables provide information on aquatic center grants awarded and applications received but not awarded during fiscal years 2019/2020, 2020/2021, and 2021/2022. Aquatic center grant applications for fiscal year 2022/2023 are still being reviewed and scored. There is \$1.6 million available to award during this fiscal year. DBW received 48 applications requesting just over \$1.57 million in funding.
