#### **OBJECTIVE**

Update on State Parks 2025 Enacted Budget.

#### INTRODUCTION

The Budget Act of 2025, SB 101, was officially enacted, along with the following Budget Bill Jr.'s (AB 102, AB 104, SB 105).

#### **DESCRIPTION**

#### Overview

The 2025-26 Budget includes \$1.014 billion to support the Department of Parks and Recreation (Department or State Parks). Of this amount, \$855.4 million is available for state operations,

\$135.6 million is available for local assistance, and \$23.26 million is available for Capital Outlay projects.

The enacted budget includes \$216.6 million General Fund (GF) and \$291.3 million State Park and Recreation Fund (SPRF) to support operations and local assistance. Overall, the 2025-26 budget represents a \$16.5 million decrease from the initial 2024-25 budget. A significant portion of the decreases are attributed to funding reductions from the Government Efficiencies Reductions and Vacancy Savings and Position Elimination drills, as well as the Harbors and Watercraft Revolving Fund Sustainability BCP.

#### **Climate Bond Update**

The enacted budget includes Proposition 4 funding in Senate Bill 105 for the 2025-26 fiscal year, which allocates funds to the following five State Park programs:

- Deferred Maintenance: \$84,400,000
- Forest Health & Watershed Improvements "Stewardship of State-Owned Lands": \$33,400,000
- Sea Level Rise Adaptation Strategy: \$24,000,000
- Statewide Park Development & Community Revitalization: \$190,000,000
- Reduction of Climate Impacts on Disadvantaged Communities & Expansion of Outdoor Recreation: \$106,500,000

## **Budget Reductions**

Statewide efforts to increase efficiency and reduce costs will affect the Department's budget for fiscal years 2024-25 and 2025-26. These measures are vital for maintaining the state's long-term fiscal stability and will ensure departments continue to manage resources responsibly.

The Department of Finance finalized the following changes:

- Vacant Positions Funding Reduction and Elimination of Positions
  - \$11,101,000 ongoing reduction to Support
    - \$10,443,000 GF
    - \$658,000 Special Fund
  - o 85.0 Positions Swept
    - Removal delayed to 1/1/2026
- State Operations Ongoing Reductions
  - o \$7,381,000 ongoing reduction to Support
    - \$7.239.000 GF
    - \$142,000 Special Fund
- GF Solutions (Previously Enacted One-Time Funding)
  - \$82,000,000 reduction
    - \$14,000,000 Deferred Maintenance Program
    - \$68,000,000 Stewardship of State-Owned Land Parks Program

With a total of \$20,429,000 in ongoing funding reductions, State Parks will implement its share of these cost savings while continuing to maintain core services and fulfill its mission.

## **Budget Change Proposals**

# **State Operations & Local Assistance**

California State Parks Library Pass Program

Funding Request: One-time transfer of \$6.75 million (GF to SPRF) for FY 2025–26.

## **Request Summary:**

- Continues the partnership with the California State Library to distribute 33,000 State Library Parks Passes to over 1,100 library branches, granting free day-use access to more than 200 state parks.
- Prioritizes library branches in areas with high poverty rates and large populations, ensuring greater access for lower-income communities.
- Extends the program to tribal libraries, allowing tribal members to visit ancestral lands at no cost.

State Parks Roads and Bridges Program

**Funding Request:** Increase annual transfer from the Highway Users Tax Account (HUTA) to the State Parks and Recreation Fund by \$8.6 million, raising the total to \$12 million beginning in FY 2025–26.

#### **Request Summary:**

- Last transfer increase was in 1993, \$1.5 million to \$3.4 million.
- California Construction Cost Index has roughly tripled since 1993.
- Addresses escalating maintenance and repair needs for 3,000 miles of roads, 152 bridges (56 major ones inspected by Caltrans), and over 38 million square feet of parking surfaces across the state park system.
- Supports more than 75 million annual visitors using state park infrastructure.

Chaptered Legislation Proposals – SB 1019 Firearms Destruction

# **Funding Request:**

- \$420,000 in 2025–26 and \$398,000 ongoing from GF
- 2.0 ongoing positions (Superintendent II and Staff Services Analyst)

#### **Request Summary:**

- Complies with SB 1019 (Ch. 547, Firearms: Destruction), requiring law enforcement agencies to develop and maintain policies for firearm and weapon destruction.
- Includes maintaining records, reporting data in the Department of Justice's Automated Firearms System, and overseeing the destruction/disposal of firearms.

**Funding Request:** California Natural Resources Agency (CNRA), State Parks, and Department of Water Resources (DWR) request a combined \$2M in fiscal year 2025-26 to support bond oversight, management, and reporting. State Parks Statewide Bond Office additionally requests 1.0 positions in 2026-27 for bond accounting and cash management.

## **Request Summary:**

- \$1.2 million for Parks in 2025-26.
- Statewide Bond Costs (SWBC) directly relates to ensuring all entities and programs authorized funding by the bond equally share the cost of oversight and reporting.
- \$75 million shall be set aside for SWBC over the life of the bond (0.75% of the total bond).
- State Parks Statewide Bond Office leads coordination, oversight, accounting, budgeting, and legal.
- CNRA is the overall lead and supports all aspects of bond accountability.
- DWR manages website support, bond systems, and application development.

## **Capital Outlay**

Border Field State Park: Monument Mesa Day Use and Interpretive Area

**Location:** Border Field State Park (SP) spans 760 acres in the southwestern corner of California. It is part of the 2,400-acre Tijuana River National Estuarine Research Reserve, established in 1982 and administered by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA).

**Scope:** The project will upgrade the outdoor educational plaza at Monument Mesa to accommodate mixed-use group events, add interpretive features and exhibits, and enhance walkways and landscaping.

Working Drawings: \$1,000,000 from Reimbursement Authority

#### **Total Estimated Project Cost: \$5,000,000**

Preliminary Plans: \$1,000,000Working Drawings: \$1,000,000

• Construction: \$2,980,000

• Equipment: \$20,000

#### **Project Timeline**

• Preliminary Plans: January 2024 – December 2025

Working Drawings: January 2026 – December 2027

• Construction: January 2028 – December 2028

**Location:** In Southeastern San Francisco, the first State Park in California designed to bring state park values to an urban area. Originally historic wetlands later converted to landfill, then landscaped park showcasing significant land-use changes in the Bay Area.

**Scope:** Design and construct an initial park build-out, including essential improvements, public access, and recreation enhancements. The project will provide core infrastructure, public access, and recreation enhancements

- Two-Phase Approach:
  - A portion of the necessary funding depends on future land transfers connected to neighboring redevelopment projects. Splitting the project ensures design documents and permits remain valid until all funding is finalized.

#### R.H. Meyer Memorial State Beach Parking Lot Expansion

**Location:** R.H. Meyer Memorial State Beach (SB) lies along Pacific Coast Highway (PCH) in Los Angeles County, about 10 miles northwest of Malibu and 3 miles southeast of Leo Carrillo Campground. It encompasses three "pocket beaches," including El Matador, known for its white sands, dramatic cliffs, and rock formations.

**Scope:** This project aims to enhance public safety and visitor experience by adding parking within the park, repairing and stabilizing the beach access trail, and installing a more durable but still permeable parking surface to reduce erosion. Additional improvements include addressing the lack of permanent restrooms (currently served by portable toilets) to minimize hazardous waste concerns and improve aesthetics.

## California Indian Heritage Center

**Location:** The project is located on the grounds of Sutter's Fort State Historic Park in Sacramento, where the State Indian Museum, built in 1940, currently faces operational and structural limitations.

**Scope:** Plans include creating a modern center for cultural preservation, learning and exchange, native land stewardship, and a celebration of California tribes. The new facilities could cover up to 120,000 square feet of indoor space, along with outdoor public areas, interpretive trails, demonstration sites, and related infrastructure. This effort addresses both the shortcomings of the 1940 facility and the need for improved educational and cultural spaces.

#### Mount Diablo State Park: Visitor Center

**Location:** Mount Diablo State Park is a 20,000-acre preserve for native species at the northern end of the Diablo Range wildlife corridor. The visitor center is at the end of Mitchell Canyon Road.

**Scope:** This project will replace the existing visitor center trailer with a larger center, remodel the existing restrooms and site to meet accessibility standards, and construct an outdoor interpretive pavilion.

Will Rogers State Historic Park: Restore Visitor Center and Other Fire-Damaged Facilities

**Location:** Will Rogers State Historic Park, nestled in Pacific Palisades with breathtaking views of the Pacific Ocean and city, offers a unique opportunity to explore the former ranch of the legendary humorist Will Rogers and enjoy scenic trails. It's a future destination for history and nature lovers.

**Scope:** This project will replace the visitor center that burned during the Palisades Fire in January 2025.

## **Funding Request:**

• \$3,600,000 from the General Fund to implement the three phases below.
