



JEDEDIAH SMITH REDWOODS STATE PARK

WELCOME! Jedediah Smith Redwoods State Park (SP) is the last in a string of redwood parks that stretch up Northern California's coast. A few miles inland from the ocean, this densely forested park protects 10,000 acres of the world's remaining old-growth redwood forest. The park is named after Jedediah Strong Smith, the first nonnative known to explore the region in the 1820s, and it sits on the ancestral land of the Tolowa Dee-ni' people, who protected these lands since time immemorial. Through this ancient forest flows the wild and scenic Smith River, California's largest undammed river system, where visitors can fish, kayak, or snorkel. Jedediah Smith Redwoods SP is also popular for its redwood hiking trails, swimming beach, and flourishing azalea shrubs and ferns.



- THINGS TO DO**
-  **If you have an hour,** drive Howland Hill scenic drive and stop at one of the many pullouts along the 8-mile-long scenic corridor to admire the big trees.
 - If you have half a day,** take Howland Hill scenic drive and stop at Stout Memorial Grove to hike the 0.5-mile loop. Then hike the 1-mile Mill Creek Trail to see Grove of Titans.
 - If you have a whole day,** hike the Simpson Reed Grove Trail and Peterson Memorial Loop (*Americans with Disabilities Act-compliant*). Continue to Howland Hill, hike the 0.5-mile Stout Memorial Grove, then stop at Mill Creek trailhead and hike a mile to see Grove of Titans. End the day exploring the coast.

- PLEASE REMEMBER**
- Pets**—Pets are not permitted on any of our trails. Find the “Bark Ranger” brochure at the visitor center for a list of dog-friendly activities and walks.
 - Respect**—All cultural and natural features are protected by law and may not be disturbed.
 - Partnership**—This park is run in partnership with the National Park Service (NPS); as a result, Jedediah Smith Redwoods SP follows NPS standards. NPS passes are accepted.
 - Wildlife**—For their safety and yours, please do not approach wildlife for any reason. State Parks is committed to keeping wildlife wild. Please do not feed wildlife; use only secure animal-proof trash cans and food storage containers.



Hiouchi Visitor Center
 The wild and scenic Smith River flows through Jedediah Smith Redwoods State Park and plays a key role in the lives of native California fish. Learn about these incredible animals at the park's Hiouchi Visitor Center.



Trailers and RV's are not permitted on Howland Hill Rd., which is hard packed gravel and dirt. Vehicle length must be under 22 feet.
