VISITOR CENTER

Stop in at the Visitor Center to learn about the history of the area, view displays and explore the Native American Plant Garden. Open weekends, call the park for hours as they change seasonally.

STAY AT THE PARK

The park's campground is among the best places to stay in the area, with many lodging and camping options to choose from. Stay among the redwoods in a private cabin with a kitchen/kitchenette and bathroom, enjoy your own space in a yurt, select your perfect tent camping site or pull the RV into one of the spacious campsites (no hook-ups).

SWIMMING POOL

Whether you're camping or just visiting for the day, the pool is the perfect place to cool off, relax and have fun. Lifeguards are on duty for this family favorite.

Fees and hours are subject to change; check park website/front entrance station for most current information.

Admission: \$5/person in addition to the day-use fees (children under 6 months of age are free.)

Hours: 1-5 p.m. on weekends and holidays between Memorial Day & Labor Day each year.

Details & Rules: Pool passes must be purchased at the front entrance kiosk.



PLEASE REMEMBER

- Bicycles and horses are allowed on some trails—please see map on other side for details.
- Dogs are allowed in campgrounds, day-use areas and roadways on a maximum 6-foot leash, but not on the trail system.
- Please be respectful of historic sites and items in the park.
- Collecting or destroying anything in the park, including mushrooms, is prohibited.

TAKE A HIKE

A contrast to much of the surrounding area, the park offers shaded redwood forests, creekside trails and more challenging hikes into chaparral. Visitors can enjoy a leisurely hike up the canyon to see volcanic ash cliffs or walk over to the historic Bale Grist Mill a short distance away. There are hikes for all ability levels and several points of interest along the way.

- Coyote Peak Trail is a single-track trail with expansive views of the forest canopy and canyons.
- History Trail starts at the Pioneer Cemetery and provides a short and easy walk over to the Historic Bale Grist Mill State Historic Park located just next door.
- Napa Valley Vine Trail connects Calistoga and St. Helena, and joins the Bothe day-use road through the park.
- Native American Garden Trail is an easy, generally accessible walking trail located next to the Visitor Center containing plants that are still used today for ceremony, food, medicine and basket weaving.

- Pioneer Cemetery Loop is ADA accessible and leads you through a meandering path around the Pioneer Cemetery.
- Redwood Trail skirts the south side of Ritchey Creek and is heavily shaded by redwoods and mixed-evergreen forest, allowing for a peaceful walk along the creek bank among the ferns and other shade-loving plants.
- Ritchey Canyon Trail is 8 miles out-and-back that takes you through the park on historic routes. This trail connects with the Upper Ritchey Canyon Trail.
- South Fork Trail and Spring Trail provides connectivity between Coyote Peak Trail, Ritchey Canyon and Redwood Trail and the Upper Ritchey Canyon. Create your own loops and adventures before returning to the trailhead.
- Upper Ritchey Canyon Trail begins at the Spring Trail Junction where Spring Trail and Ritchey Canyon Trail meet. The trail leads to the site of the Traverso Homestead dating to the 1880s. Few remnants of the homestead remain.
- Vineyard Trail loops off of Ritchey Canyon Trail and past a small section of vineyard. Popular with trail runners.
